

Training and Technical Assistance

TRAINING

Training services include a wide range of topics relating to domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, sex trafficking, teen relationship violence (dating violence) and the missing and murdered. The length of training varies from a minimum of 4 hours to 1-3 days depending on the level of need and are provided with the assistance of partners and/or subject matter experts who serve as SWIWC faculty.

Trainings are interactive, culturally competent, and based on best practices available. They are offered statewide, regionally or on-site and may involve a fee which includes the expenses related to the time and travel of staff and faculty in developing and providing the training.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

Technical assistance (TA) services are tailored specifically to meet the needs of those requesting the service. TA sessions are held onsite from 1-2.5 days and are designed to be hands-on, practical, and aimed at increasing the capacity to address and respond to domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, sex trafficking and teen relationship violence (dating violence). TA sessions are provided with the assistance of partners and/or experts who serve as faculty and may involve a fee for the time and travel expenses of staff and faculty to develop and conduct the TA session.
